Applications of difference equations in biology, and economics. <p>Applied methods of education:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - lecture with mulimedia presentation accompanied with examples presented on the blackboard and with questions to the group of students, the students' activity is taken into account during the final evaluation (the students prepare and deliver the presentations in small groups) - classes: solving problems on the board, initiating discassion about the solutions.
