### Course description

<ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. Mechanics: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• kinematic and dynamic of translation (Newton's Laws, conservation of mechanical energy, conservation of linear momentum),</li> <li>• kinematic and dynamic of rotation (Newton's second Law for rotation, conservation of angular momentum),</li> <li>• oscillations: mechanical oscillations (simple harmonic motion (SHM), kinematics and energy of SHM, forced oscillations, damping, resonance),</li> <li>• mechanical waves: transverse and longitudinal waves, the speed of a traveling wave, energy and power of a traveling wave, the principle of superposition for waves, interference of waves, standing waves, sound waves, ultrasounds, infrasounds, Doppler effect.</li> </ul> </li> <li>2. Gravitation: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• gravitational field and force, orbits and energy of satellites, effect of gravity on space-time, curvature of space.</li> </ul> </li> <li>3. Thermodynamics: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• The Zeroth, First and Second Law of Thermodynamics,</li> <li>• the kinetic theory of gases,</li> <li>• heat transfer mechanisms.</li> </ul> </li> <li>4. Electromagnetism: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• electric field (the electric field due to a point charge and an electric dipole, Coulomb's Law, the Gauss' Law: cylindrical, planar and spherical symmetry, electric potential, capacitance),</li> <li>• magnetic field (magnetic field due to a current, electrodynamic force, Biot-Savart Law, Ampere's Law, Gauss' Law for magnetic, Faraday's Law of induction, Lenz's Law),</li> <li>• charge particle in electric and magnetic field; cyclotrons and synchrotrons,</li> <li>• conductivity/ the electrical properties of solids, energy levels in solids (metals, insulators, semiconductors, <i>n</i>-type and <i>p</i>-type semiconductors, the <i>p-n</i> junction), superconductors,</li> <li>• magnetic materials (diamagnetism, paramagnetism, ferromagnetism).</li> <li>• electromagnetic waves: Maxwell's equations, the electromagnetic spectrum.</li> </ul> </li> <li>5. Optics: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• reflection and refraction of light, total internal reflection of light, critical angle, white light, dispersion, diffraction, interference and polarization of light, diffraction gratings, Brewster's Law,</li> <li>• travelling of electromagnetic waves in the medium (VIS and IR range) – classical and photonic optical fibres,</li> <li>• lasers – work and applications.</li> </ul> </li> <li>6. Special theory of relativity (relativity, the speed of light postulate, mass and energy, time dilatation, length contraction, the twin paradox, Doppler effect of light).</li> <li>7. Selected problems of modern physics: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• the hydrogen atom</li> <li>• quantum nature of light (photons, the photoelectric effect),</li> <li>• matter waves (de Broglie waves),</li> <li>• Schrödinger's equation, Heisenberg's uncertainty principle,</li> <li>• barrier tunneling effect – STM the scanning tunneling microscope,</li> <li>• low-dimensional structures (nanocrystallites, quantum dots, quantum corrals, graphene).</li> </ul> </li> </ol>
