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### Prerequisites

The student should have basic knowledge of the functioning of the state system and the law; the ability for multi-vector and critical analysis; should have basic knowledge of legal and institutional mechanisms regulating social and economic life.

### Course objective

Providing students with basic information on the legal system and branches of law, with particular emphasis on civil and commercial law.

#### Methods for verifying learning outcomes and assessment criteria

Learning outcomes presented above are verified as follows:

Lecture: Knowledge verified on the basis of the lecture material and resources for individual learning made available to participants. Credit-based on a periodical test and a final test, consisting of 10-15 single-choice closed questions. For each correctly given answer to the question you can get 1 point.

The value of the periodic test is the ratio of 30% of the final grade, assuming that all the questions posed in the periodic test are correctly answered.

Failure to approach the periodical test is tantamount to getting 0% of correct answers.

The value of the final test is 70% of the final grade.

The periodic and final test is not only scored.

The final grade is the result of the periodic test of 30% and the final test of 70%, depending on the number of points obtained in each of these tests.

The scale of the final grade, including the value of the periodic test and the value of the final exam, is as follows:

95% - 100% = 5.0

81% - 94% = 4.5

71% - 80% = 4.0

61% - 70% = 3.5



51% - 60% = 3.0

50% > 0% = 2.0

- a lecture supplemented with materials for self-study in the eKursy system,

- introducing a new topic preceded by a reminder of related content, known to students from other previous lectures.
