### Prerequisites

Knowledge: The already acquired language competence compatible with level B1 (CEFR). Skills: The ability to use vocabulary and grammatical structures required on the high school graduation exam with regard to productive and receptive skills. Social competencies: The ability to work individually and in a group; the ability to use various sources of information and reference works.

### Course objective

Advancing students' language competence towards at least level B2 (CEFR). Development of the ability to use academic and field specific language effectively in both receptive and productive language skills. Improving the ability to understand field specific texts (familiarizing students with basic translation techniques). Improving the ability to function effectively on an international market and on a daily basis.

### Course-related learning outcomes

Knowledge:

1. Student has knowledge of fundamental issues in English in the scope of management characteristic for logistics and supply chain management [P6S\_WG\_08]
2. Student has knowledge of the foreign language in the scope of grammatical structures, general

vocabulary and vocabulary relevant to the field of logistics [P6S\_WK\_02]

1. Student is able to collect on the basis of the literature of the subject and other sources in English and, in an orderly manner, provide information on the problem within the framework of logistics and its specific issues and supply chain management [P6S\_UW\_01]

### Methods for verifying learning outcomes and assessment criteria

Learning outcomes presented above are verified as follows:

Knowledge acquired in the course of learning may be verified by the following methods: written and oral tests, presentations, project, homework. Detailed assessment criteria are specified by lecturers. At the end of the semester, the

student is given a grade based on performance throughout the semester in line with the grading scale:

Following semester 3, the student takes the examination that consists of written and oral parts.

Warehousing and storage, transport and distribution, documentation and finance

As a result of the course, the student ought to acquire technical language related to the following issues:

1. Warehousing and storage: areas, equipment; automation
2. Transport and distribution: transporting fresh produce
3. Documentation and finance: export documentation; payment methods
